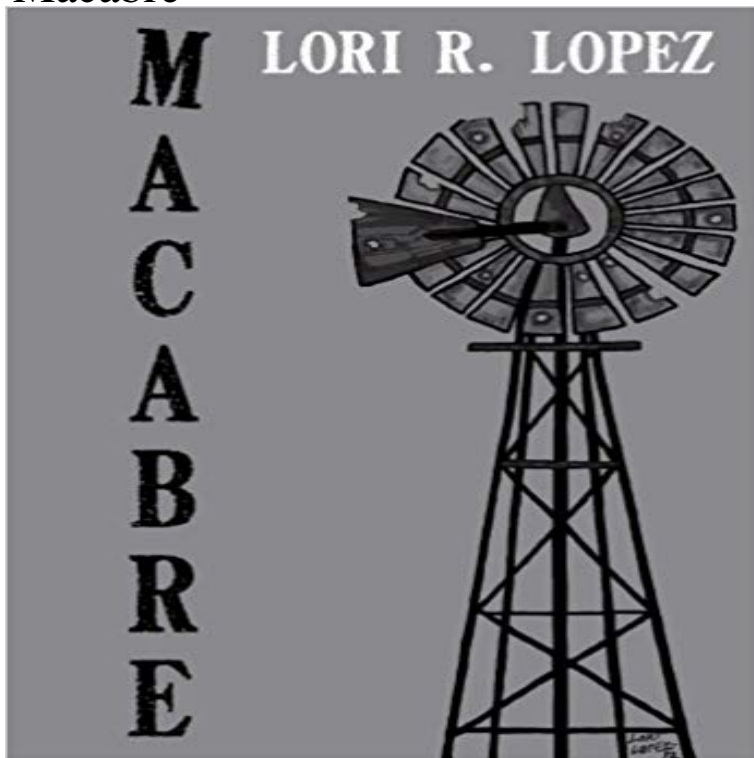


Macabre
